Lansdowne PAC Fundraising Reminders Thrifty Foods Smile Cards



Foundation Skills Assessment



During the latter half of January through to mid-February, grade 7 students throughout British Columbia will be completing the Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA). This assessment provides a snapshot of each student's ability in reading comprehension, writing, and numeracy in relation to provincial performance standards—widely held expectations for grade 7 students in these core areas. Results will be mailed to parents later in the school year.

Along with feedback from your child's teachers, the FSA can provide you (and the school's faculty) with further information about your child's abilities in these core areas as well as providing information on more general trends at the provincial, district, and school level regarding overall progress and areas for further improvement. FIRST LEGO LEAGUE

The Lansdowne FLL team "The Forgotten Socks" attended the FIRST LEGO League Regional Qualifying Tournament in Vancouver on Saturday, January 4.

Eleven teams were doing presentations (all about some aspects of natural disasters and possible innovative solutions), interviews and practice robot runs in the morning, and scored robot runs in the afternoon.

It was a fun day in Vancouver, and our team did very well. We started out with the Core Values interview, then did the project presentation right after. Our project was about wildfires, and the team performed a skit demonstrating a new fire detection method for the Victoria watershed area. They even had a Lego-and-Marble-Track – built model of their fire detection idea.

Later the team explained the robot and its design and programming to a panel of judges. During robot matches the robot did its part, too, with a scoring ability in the top third of all robots. Although it did not do all its top scoring in the same run, so we ended up having 153 as our best score instead of 217. Oh well, these things happen....

There were lots of interesting robots to see, neat team uniforms, great props, good energy, lots of laughter and cheering, and much photography and videotaping.

Congratulations to the team from Monterey School who won the Core Values award!

The tournament was a great team outing with family involved for everyone. Owen's family even provided free accommodation in Vancouver.

This ends our official FLL season, but the team may decide to continue meeting anyway. Maybe we'll start preparations for next year....!

Handwashing Tips from HealthLinkBC



Handwashing is a simple and effective way to help prevent colds and the flu.

Washing your hands

often, especially during cold and flu season, can reduce your risk of catching or spreading a cold or the flu.

Wash your hands after:

- Touching parts of your body that are not clean.
- Using the bathroom.
- Coughing, sneezing, or using a handkerchief or disposable tissue.
- Eating or drinking
- Changing diapers, handling garbage, using the phone, shaking hands, or playing with pets.

Experts recommend the following steps for proper handwashing:

- Wash your hands with running water and soap.
- Rub your hands together for at least 20 seconds.
- Pay special attention to your wrists, the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your fingernails.
- Leave the water running while you dry your hands on a paper towel.
- Use the paper towel as a barrier between the faucet and your clean hands when you turn off the water.

If soap and water are not available, use gel hand sanitizers or alcohol-based hand wipes containing 60% to 90% ethyl alcohol or isopropanol. Most supermarkets and drugstores carry these products. Carry one or both with you when you travel, and keep them in your backpack or purse.

If using the gel sanitizer, rub your hands until the gel is dry. You don't need to use water. The alcohol in the gel kills the germs on your hands.

Eco Action meets weekly on Mondays at lunch. Everyone is welcome! We are currently focusing on water consumption, personally and school wide. Stay tuned for some more facts during the morning announcements.

DID YOU KNOW?

An average snowflake is made up of 180 billion molecules of water. And all of those molecules form completely different shapes for each snowflake! On a typical winter day, snowflakes will fall at a speed of 5 kilometres an hour.



As we work on putting all of our recycling materials in the right bins, often the following question arises "If we don't have any place to wash out our items, what is the alternative?"

ANSWER: If you are unable to wash out your containers, take them back home and wash them there. If you can, try to bring reusable containers so that there is no recycling needed at all. We try to promote waste-free lunches, let's see how you do! According to research, a family that packs prepackaged lunches will spend an average of \$4 a day per lunch or \$724 per school year, while a family that packs waste-free lunches will spend \$2.65 a day per lunch or \$477 per school year.

YOUTH CREATING INCLUSION CREW

Our Youth Creating Inclusion Crew (YCI) aims to increase awareness, share knowledge and create inclusion with the goal of eliminating all forms of discrimination. This open group (we are always happy to have more voices) meets weekly to explore issues that arise in our school and in our communities as well as create activities and actions to share with students, staff, families and our community. Presently, we are focused on understanding identity, especially gender identity, gender stereotypes, gender fluidity and other forms of gender identity. We attend the monthly school district 61 Gay Straight Alliance Advisory Committee meetings and speak on our school's initiatives and ways in which we demonstrate addressing discrimination in our school. Last week we attended a meeting to discuss upcoming ventures including a district dance, a youth forum, a movie night and revisiting the district regulation around discrimination to include gender inclusive bathrooms in schools. Observations from my time at Lansdowne Middle School



I have been participating in the Eco-Action club, where we have been focusing on water. It has been really interesting to participate in these meetings, and get some info about water use. It has definitely made me more aware of how we use our water and how much water we actually are wasting.

We have also been focusing on Recycling, because Lansdowne is a green school, so it has been really great to see how everyone is recycling their garbage, especially because Denmark isn't recycling as much as here. I think we should be doing that, so that is definitely something that I will bring back to Denmark. I find it very important to take care of our environment!

I have also been a part of the YCI, where we have been watching some great movies about gender, and been talking about how we can create a more inclusive and positive space at our school. I must say that I am really impressed by the students and all the amazing ideas they came up with.

I also went to Vancouver to witness and participate in the Truth and Reconciliation with Mitchel and some students. I had never heard about Residential schools before, so I was very excited to go to the workshop and get some more knowledge about it. I quickly learned about all the terrible things that had happened at some of the residential schools, and how the trauma that they had experienced at the residential schools had affected the lives of many of First Nations people. I was and still am very surprised that I had never heard about it before. I am really interested in learning more about Indigenous history and culture. I have been collecting lots of material and resources about what happened historically the residential schools and the aftermath, so I can create more awareness about it in Denmark. I feel like it is very important for people to know what happened to the First Nations People, not that many years ago.

At the workshop in Vancouver we were introduced to two projects. Project of Heart and The Blanket Exercise. Both exercises' related to Canadian history and residential schools. Project of heart was to honor the children who died or survived residential schools. The blanket exercise was to create awareness of Canadian history and to show how the land was taken away from the indigenous people by the Europeans. It was incredibly powerful to be a part of this event, and to hear the survivors telling their stories. I feel really fortunate to have been a part of this.

So, my last 5 months at Lansdowne Middle School have been very interesting, and it has opened my eyes to a lot of new things. I feel like I learned a lot from my time here, and I am very excited to bring the things I learned in my practicum back to Denmark in February. Thank you to everyone whom I have connected with here at Lansdowne. It has been GREAT!!!



Bicycle Safety



We are pleased to see an increasing number of students cycling to and from school. It is both a healthy and environmentally friendly mode of transportation that we strongly support. At the same time, please remind your children of the importance of bicycle safety, including:

- Wear a bike helmet (that fits properly)
- Cycle on the road or cycle paths (do *not* weave on and off the sidewalk)
- Adhere to all rules of the road, which include:
 - ♦ Cycle on the right side of the road
 - ♦ Obey all stop signs and traffic signals
 - Obey the "right of way" at intersections(when in doubt, giving "right" of way to the motor vehicle is good common sense)
 - ♦ Signal your turns
 - ♦ And much more...
- Wear bright or reflective clothing and/or a cycling vest
- If cycling near or during dark hours, use front and rear lights
