Highlights from the Vancouver Island Parent Conference

On February 1st, three Lansdowne parents and Principal Ken Andrews attended the day-long Vancouver Island Parent Conference. A few highlights from a parent's perspective are shared here. Capturing the highlights has not been an easy task, as the entire day was filled with learning. Mark Albany led a spirited and interactive discussion on "Moving Schools Away from Institutionalized Discrimination". Mark's talent was in creating a space in which individuals could safely express their own experiences, while developing new insights. Gordon Neufeld's presentation on "Helping Children Flourish" reinforced the value of "play" in all of our lives, but particularly in the lives of our children ~ if we have expected "outcomes" it is not play, it is work! Gordon also noted that "more tears equal more adaptive brains". The lesson I took from the captivating Alvin Law ("There's No Such Word as Can't") is epitomized in the image of Alvin as a child, falling face first onto the ice rink as he attempts to learn to skate for the first time. Alvin was born with no arms. Judie Waldie, a Principal in our district, and several of her colleagues, ("Self Regulation and Cultural Change") presented on techniques they are using in the classroom to help children regulate their response to daily stressors - with a view to improving students' ability to participate in classroom activities. This approach respects the differing ways that individual students respond to circumstances, and helps students find ways to regulate themselves. This builds on our school district's participation in the neuroscience research into self-regulation as a First Wave Team in the Canadian Self-Regulation Initiative. Parents at the conference were given access to a reading list compiled by Island Sexual Health. 


please submit this in writing (letter or e-mail) to Mr. Andrews – kandrews@sd61.bc.ca – by April 30, 2014. We will attempt to incorporate your suggestions into our plans. Your letter or email should outline educational reasons, not just teacher preference. There will be situations where it will not be possible to accommodate all requests because of the many factors involved in trying to build the best possible educational experience for all students. Among the factors we consider are: peer relationships; the child's social, emotional, physical, and intellectual needs; balancing the number of boys and girls in a class; providing enriched opportunities and remedial support; balancing numbers of students between classes; and trying to create the most advantageous overall educational setting possible for all students. We try



to accommodate all requests received by April 30th. It is much more difficult to accommodate any requests received once the class-building process has begun. We will begin class building in May, but all lists will be considered temporary until later in September when we can confirm numbers and staffing.

Counsellors Corner

Pink Shirt Day at Lansdowne



Pink Shirt Day was once again recognized and honored at Lansdowne Middle School. Student leadership took on the initiative and encouraged all students and staff to wear pink in support of a bully free school and community. 52 Student leaders also went to Hillside Center and Sang the song 'True Colors' and gave out 'Bullying Stops Here' bracelets to patrons as they had lunch and relaxed in the food court. The students sang beautifully and made us proud.

On Monday, March 3rd I attended an Erase Bullying training session with many other school counselors, administrators, and teachers in the district. It was a very valuable workshop. Creating safe and inclusive schools is something our district takes very seriously. Much of the training in this particular session dealt with cyber bullying and the dangers of unsupervised, unrestricted internet access. One quote that stuck with me was "Technology is a true gift for cowards who bully. They don't have to look at their victims, and they don't have to deal with the immediate negative reactions from bystanders".

It is critical that staff and parents educate themselves and our children and youth of the dangers of technology, as well as the advantages and proper use. Another point made in the training that resonated with me was ensuring we distinguish between mean behavior, criminal behavior and bullying. All three forms of negative behavior are unhealthy and need to be addressed. However, the severity of the response will vary depending on the offense.

Perhaps the most poignant message I left with focused on the best way to combat bullying. It isn't necessarily through an anti bullying program, but rather by creating a positive school climate through

activities that empower students to make good choices and feel good about themselves. Our music program, athletics, student leadership, YCI, Police Liaison visits, champion program, games groups, fine arts, library program, learning support and counseling services are but a few ways outside of academics that we foster positive and healthy development. A school where every student feels connected with at least one caring adult and where topics of inclusion are addressed is key. At Lansdowne we foster being allies, standing up and speaking out to acts of mean behavior, aggression and bullying. We know that people who hurt, hurt others. We need to help the bully, the bullied and the bystander.

The **Learning Through Loss** is offering a free support group for youth aged 13–18 experiencing loss including:

- Death or loss of a family member, friend or pet
- Moving to a new home or community
- Divorce
- Illness
- Bullying

Referrals can be made by anyone. Our Registered Clinical Counsellor receives all referrals and will contact the prospective youth to complete the screening and intake process. A maximum of twelve participants meet for sessions in a confidential and supportive setting to learn about healthy grieving and healing. If one group is full, interested youth will be put on a waitlist.

Requirements and responsibilities for acceptance into the program:

- Youth aged 13–18 who reside within School Districts 61, 62, and 63.
- Voluntary participation and commitment to attending the entire duration of the program.
- Participants are responsible for transportation to and from each session.
- Participants are to not be under the influence of alcohol and other drugs.
